"SIIA welcomes a process that leads to a balanced, reasonable dialogue between technologists, security experts, industry representatives, law enforcement and national security leaders. Strong encryption is essential for privacy, data security, and global commerce. Law enforcement access to information under appropriate due process is a common and well understood practice in the technology industry, and it is critical to keeping the public safe. But the issues here are complex, and we face the very real danger that overly broad access to secure systems could undermine the very safety and security we seek," said Mark MacCarthy, Software & Information Industry Association Senior Vice President of Public Policy. "The significant risk associated with this issue demands a thoughtful and deliberate response."

"A commission created by the Congress, with a membership drawn from every interested quarter in the debates around consumer technology and law enforcement, is a very good idea.
