Dear Chairman Blunt and Ranking Member Murray:

As you prepare the fiscal year (FY) 2019 Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies appropriations bill, we urge you to prioritize funding for diabetes programs within the Department of Health and Human Services.

The United States is facing a diabetes epidemic. More than 30 million Americans—almost 10 percent of the population—have diabetes. An additional 84 million more have prediabetes, and nine out of ten of those with prediabetes are not yet aware that they are at risk.

The burden of this disease is significant. If present trends continue, one in three adults—up to two in three among certain minority populations—will have diabetes in 2050. The annual cost of diagnosed and undiagnosed diabetes, including type 1 and type 2, gestational diabetes, and prediabetes has skyrocketed to \$327 billion. This is unacceptable and unsustainable.

Federal diabetes-related programs are changing the lives of those with the disease. Prevention programs at Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) are helping to lower the incidence of the disease, and promising research at the National Institutes of Health (NIH) may one day yield a cure. The progress that has been made is remarkable, but more needs to be done.

We appreciate your prioritization of the following programs in the FY 2019 appropriations bill, which will help ensure that critical projects already underway can be enhanced and expanded, and will help to turn the tide of this national epidemic:

- National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases (NIDDK). NIDDK is the
 fifth largest institute housed at the NIH, and it is the primary government agency responsible for
 conducting research to find a cure and advance diabetes treatments. Investment in NIDDK is
 needed to support work across the country to discover groundbreaking treatments and ultimately
 a cure
- CDC's Division of Diabetes Translation (DDT). DDT leads efforts to prevent diabetes and its difficult complications by developing and implementing state and community-level prevention strategies, outcomes-based research, and educational activities. Support for DDT is needed to

expand innovative national and state-based prevention and education programs and research studies to reign in the human and economic costs of the diabetes epidemic.

National Diabetes Prevention Program (National DPP) at CDC. The National DPP is a
public-private partnership of community, health care, and faith-based organizations, private
insurers, employers, and government agencies aimed at preventing diabetes in Americans at risk
of the disease, including half of all Americans aged 65 and older. Funding for the National DPP
is needed to expand this cost-effective, highly successful diabetes prevention program.

Thank you for your past bipartisan support of diabetes-related programs. We urge you to continue that support in FY 2019. These investments are necessary to transform the lives of those living with, and at risk for, diabetes.
